Another Tour de Force by Alicia Jo Straka

As I point out every time I volunteer to write up an SFAC musical program review, I am not a musician and do not read sheet music. I still remember from the 1960s how to recognize and play guitar chords and identify common progressions; but not so much for French musette pieces, like the ones Alicia Jo Straka so blissfully played for us in March, her self-said favorite type of music.

Therefore, this program review cannot and will not read like ones written by SFAC musician-authors – nothing about glissando, registers, crescendo, and the like. Alas, I do at least know what a bellows shake is, but I don't think Alicia used that particular crowd-pleaser. Twice she called attention to the fact she had ended songs with her bellows out! **Um, I was shocked!** She made fun of herself for having done so, stating this was a "lack of showmanship, but I'm not competing anymore!"

That's a good thing for the competition accordionists out there, since they won't have to trump Alicia Jo Straka. Having seen her play for the SFAC no fewer than 3 times prior to this month, I can testify she only competes with earlier versions of herself. An accomplished accordion player since childhood, it's Alicia's singing that to my ears has gone through the most stunning evolution. I will point out examples of this when I actually get to her performance.

Because it was Saint Patrick's Day, Alicia started out with a medley of three standard Irish tunes, two of which were jig



tunes (*Castle Donovan* and *Merrily Kiss the Quaker*). Another tune inserted in the middle (*Shebag Shemore*) was slow and peacefully wistful. Having paid respect to St. Patty's Day, it was obvious she couldn't wait to get to what she "really likes", French music. She started out with a jazzy *Que reste-t-il de nos amours*, which was familiar to me as the Sinatra recording *I Wish You Love* (many others have also recorded this version). The original French version was popularized by Charles Trenet, "the French Sinatra" according to Phillipe, a

g was on full display in this ay in her voice, maybe a

French student of mine in the 1980s who made me aware of Trenet. Alicia's polished singing was on full display in this song, full of artful inflections and unexpected cadence changes. I heard so much Billie Holiday in her voice, maybe a hint of Cab Calloway. My father once told me that he had met Holiday at the Apollo Theater in New York.

One good musette deserves another, hence Alicia's next selection, *Le Balajo*. When I see a French word I do not know (which is most of them, since I studied French in grade school so long ago), I just gotta look it up – so I did.

The rue de Lappe, a stone's throw from the Place de la Bastille, is one of the most iconic streets for Parisian nightlife. The **Balajo**, situated at No. 9, has been there since 1935 and remains an institution for all night owls and dance lovers!

I was so happy we got a polka next (*Tyrolean Echoes*, first recorded on New Year's Eve, 1909!), because as Alicia said of polkas, "they are fun and it's an accordion". One reason I was so happy being treated to a joyous polka was because I immediately saw an opportunity to revive a column that intermittently popped up in the SFAC newsletter years ago called "Accordion Encounters". Elaine and I had had a chance to see Mollie B. and her band Squeeze Box play in Pinellas Park, Florida, just a few months ago.



Next was an original, *As Long as I'm with You*, a sweet love song that Alicia dedicated to her husband. It sure sounded like a show tune to me, right out of a Broadway musical, with some knock-out cabaret style chords. This song is featured on a CD she did in a recording studio in Boston at the height of the pandemic. (Later in her program she played another original composition from this CD, *Musette à Paris*, the sheet music for which is available at her web site, https://www.aliciajostraka.com).

Next, it was back to Ireland for a medley of *Galway Girl*, "a pop song with folk roots"; and a reel called *Drowsy Maggie*, which I looked up to find that a reel has four beats to a measure with emphasis on the first and third beats. Oh.

I nearly jumped out of my chair (well, emerged from an anti-ergonomic slump on the couch) at the first 2 notes of Alicia's next selection, *Petite Fleur (Little Flower)*. I knew this song well from my early childhood, when it was an instru-

mental hit song heard over and over again on the AM radio. I eventually learned it had been first recorded by the brilliant jazz musician Sidney Bechet in 1952. Alicia performed it with French lyrics that the web told me had been added to the original recording later on.

Alicia was clearly so moved playing her next selection, Don't Know Why, that she was



unable to speak for a full 12 seconds (I timed it) after completing it. I looked up the lyrics to better understand why this had been the case, and interpreted the song to be a an uber-tragic tale of a romantic connection gone bad. I have put a poignant verse in a textbox to exemplify the depth of composer Norah Jones' despair. As Alicia rendered this song, it was clear that she was not so much playing the accordion as the accordion was

Out across the endless sea I would die in ecstasy But I'll be a bag of bones Driving down the road alone My heart is drenched in wine But you'll be on my mind forever

clear that she was not so much playing the accordion as the accordion was playing her. That was obvious throughout her set, but particularly so during this gut-wrenching song.

Perhaps to relieve the tension, Alicia followed with an airy, beautiful masterpiece that all accordion lovers love, La Valse d'Amélie (Yann Tiersen), from the movie Amélie, "getting older but still very fun and the music is amazing." Hearing this I recalled the retired **The Great Morgani's** charming rendition of this song at several Cotati festivals. I also recalled that my wife Elaine and some accordion buddies used to practice this song as a trio and then a duo in our living room - so trust me, I really know this song!

I have inserted a photo to the right of Alicia playing her next song, an original polka called *Pretzel*, which was really cracking her up! Do you think she likes polka? *Pretzel* sheet music is available on her website, notated for solo accordion with Stradella bass. (https://www.aliciajostraka.com)





After a lively polka, what comes best is a French tune, if Alicia has

anything to say about it. How about *La Vie en Rose*? It started out very Piaf-style (see leftmost photo), but Alicia just can't stray far from jazz for very long – in this case, 85 seconds, after which jazz-style took over (see adjacent photo at left). She finished the song Piaf-style, with English lyrics.

When you press me to your heart
I'm in a world apart
A world where roses bloom
And when you speak, angels sing from above
Everyday words seem to turn into love songs
Give your heart and soul to me
And life will always be
"La vie en rose"

Alicia's show closer was a fast one, El camino de que.

Set List Tips for Themed Gigs


Occasionally I am hired to play my accordion during happy hour at a local senior living site. Recently I received an unusual request for Chinese-themed music to celebrate the Lunar New Year. I'd never heard of a Chinese set list. I had to be ready in less than two weeks!

A successful set list for a gig, I've learned, requires a majority of tunes that your audience relates to. An entire set list of traditional Chinese tunes could put my audience to sleep. Some of the Chinese-sounding tunes use parallel fourths, fifths, octaves, and minor thirds. A broad set list incorporates a wide variety rhythms and melodies to create interest. Choosing familiar US hits helps hold the listener's attention. To engage my audience, I prepare and distribute my musical program.

Tip 1: Experience. Growing up in SF, I heard and remembered Chinese songs (including *Rose, Rose, I Love You*) and American hits performed by a SF Chinatown band.

Tip 2: Research. I pored over standard lead line books from the early 1900s to the 60s looking for titles and lyrics referring to China or Chinese. *Chinatown, My Chinatown*

(1906) is considered an early jazz standard that features the fourth and fifth sounds in the tune. I also discovered *On a Slow Boat to China*. A Google search resulted in *Moon Represents My Heart*, a classic Mandarin pop song.



Tip 4: Broadway, Movie Themes and Pop. Musicals are a great source for finding supportive theme tunes. I hit the jackpot with eight accordion suitable titles from the *Flower Drum Song*. (I have a *Night in Paris* 4-hour gig coming up. Along with musettes and traditional tunes, fillers for my French-themed gig includes selections from **Les Misérables, Phantom of the Opera, Amélie**, and **Gigi**.)

Tip 5: Tie-ins. Chinese Dance (Nutcracker Suite), Polka Chinoise and China Nights (Japanese origin) stretched the set list titles. I also incorporated tunes related to San Francisco and California because San Francisco has the largest Chinatown outside of China. And these tunes are played at SF Chinese events.


