In his own words: Bobby Dietsch's bio

I started playing the accordion when I was seven years old and never stopped. I began playing professionally at the age of fifteen, to help put myself through college.

My accordion style is rather unique. Because my favorite music is ethnic music from around the world, the audience is already familiar with many of the songs I play.

I like to emphasize passion and my own style when performing, rather than just "technique." Being classically trained, I use most of the switches on "both" the right and left hands; and prefer to use the left hand as another instrument to complement the right hand, as was taught by Galla-Rini.

Throughout the years, I've played jobs as a soloist and with groups, including The Reunion Ensemble and the Alpine Quartet. I've also performed at many different venues, including three times in Las Vegas, church events, Oktoberfests, accordion clubs, restaurants, and private parties.

I learned to repair and restore accordions, and purchased my own accordion business from Sam Costabile. There's nothing quite like bringing vintage accordions back to their glory days.

After all these years, it's hard to describe the joy it gives me to still be able to play and see the people's reaction to my music.



My instrument is flugelhorn and euphonium. Most other German bands would bring either a concertina, Steirische Harmonika or piano accordion. I'm hoping the joyful distant day will come when I can give my lips a rest and play the bayan accordion.

The credit for jump-starting my journey with the accordion goes to Weird Al Yankovic, strangely enough. The accordion



always had a presence in my life, though it was in the background for most of it. My family is from the Czech Republic, and my aunt played for a very long time. I remember experimenting with her accordion when I was about five or six; no real music, I was just fascinated with the multitude of buttons. Jumping forward

sixteen years (with about eight years of choir and four years of piano thrown into the mix), in college I happened to see a YouTube video of Weird Al playing a short song on an accordion app for the iPad. This sparked a cascade of events: I downloaded the same app myself and became hooked, we happened to visit family in the Czech Republic that summer so I had the opportunity to try out my aunt's accordion again, that led to almost my entire vacation being spent in the barn practicing, and that resulted in my folks purchasing one as a Christmas present from **Smythe's Accordion Center** in Oakland (now located in Petaluma).

I practiced and played regularly for about four years, incorporating it into my artistic career as much as I could (I studied acting at CalArts in Southern California; the picture is from a production of Shakespeare's The Merchant of Venice). I played all kinds of genres, with a preference for Czech polkas and Viennese waltzes. As so often happens, life eventually got in the way and I stopped playing. But a few months ago, an old high school friend mentioned that he had started playing, suggesting that I check out the SFAC. I'm very glad I did, and look forward to rekindling my love for this unique instrument.

Bach's Birthday at BART

KCBS All News Radio sent a reporter to cover the musical event and interview Colette and Joseph, as well as commuters who loved having live music as part of their travels. What a great way to create positive accordion outreach for our communities!

Music Therapy: Can Accordionists Squeeze In?

Professional healers sometimes encounter non-practitioners who falsely claim their skill set. For example, a friend or bartender might identify as an "amateur psychologist, but a lot less expensive." Undeterred by this trope, I confess to having embraced an amateur musical therapy role for the past three years. I played accordion at a memory unit where my father resided (the Elder Ashram, on Fruitvale Avenue, in Oakland). Residents some-

times considered me a hired hand, although I received no financial recompense.

The therapy was two-way, broadly considered. Strolling without sheet music helped me improve my musical chops, which still fall far short of virtuoso level. I recall an interview with the Smothers Brothers. They advised as-



piring musicians to play in front of others, rather than remaining at home. Good advice, really. After playing in the Elder Ashram, I felt more confident. Sharing music represents a symbiotic endeavor. Music communicates symbolically and artistically, fostering warmth and understanding.

I tailored my music for residents and employees. For example, I played *O Sole Mio* and the theme from *The Godfather (II Padrino)* for my Italian American listeners. The Latin American contingent fancied *Bésame Mucho*, or *Cielito Lindo*, and the Filipinos brightened when I played the melodramatic *Dahil Sa Iyo (Because of You)*. I also discovered the utility of sing-alongs, including *You Are My Sunshine, Tennessee Waltz*, and *Home on the Range*. Special occasion tunes included *Happy Birthday*, the *Anniversary Waltz*, and military songs for Veterans Day.

Realist painter Louis Gaillait (1810-1887) painted a brother comforting his sister next to a tomb, by playing the violin. In the play *The Mourning Bride* (1697), English poet William Congreve insisted that "music hath charms to sooth a savage breast" (often misquoted as "...savage beast"), suggesting therapeutic benefits. Music therapy is ancient, even if formal recognition developed more recently.

Today, the American Music Therapy Association (AMTA) describes an allied health profession that nurtures "...clinical and evidence-based use of music interventions to accomplish individualized goals," within a therapeutic context. We are told that, "Modalities include the use of melody, harmony, and instrumentation, fostering physical, mental, and social benefits." Target audiences for music therapy include premature infants, autistic youth, stroke patients, and individuals with dementia, among other categories. As a geriatrician visiting the elderly, I was struck by the extent to which elders with major cognitive deficits may still recall the words to old songs, often expressing joy as buried memories come alive. Trained musical therapists work as a team with doctors, nurses, caregivers, and families.

If you aspire to becoming a music therapist, check out the website of the AMTA. The mission of this organization is to "advance public awareness of the benefits of music therapy and increase access to quality music therapy services in a

rapidly changing world." AMTA offers services to 3,500 members focusing on "...education, professional development, networking, and advocacy opportunities through an annual conference, academic journals, research efforts, government relations activities, social media and volunteer activities." If I were a young person with an interest in both music and helping others, I might check out music therapy. These intrepid allied health professionals work in schools, psychiatric facilities, adult day care, group homes, forensic settings, and the Veterans Administration.

Alas, my gig at the Elder Ashram ended this month, as my father was transferred. Who knows, perhaps I may play there again, to see old friends. The challenge of aging faces all members of the human family. Moreover, music is an art that fosters ongoing connections. A relative, however, advised me not to play my accordion at Bob's new home. That's OK. Accordionists are a resilient crew. As singer Gloria Gaynor put it, "I will survive!"

March 2025 Northern California Performance: Félicien Brut

Last month four international award-winning musicians convened only a few days ahead of time to participate in three "Corey Cerovsek & Friends" outstanding concerts in San Francisco, Walnut Creek and Palo Alto, sponsored by Chamber Music San Francisco. The audiences were treated to a variety of quartet, duet and solo pieces performed by a combo with Corey Cerovsek (violin, Canada), Lucienne Renaudin Vary (trumpet, France), Félicien Brut (accordion, France), and Steven Vanhauwaert (piano, Belgium). The program consisted mainly of a variety of French-themed music and composers (Milhaud, Poulenc, Saint-Saens, Piaf, Debussy). The quartet's final tune was Gershwin's lively An American in Paris.

Félicien performed accordion tango standards (Oblivion by Piazzolla and Tango Pour Claude by Galliano) with grace and passion. [While in the audience I thought to myself, "This is the excitement that the audience may have felt while attending a Guido Deiro concert during the 1920's."] Félicien and Lucien played an elegant jazz arrangement of L'Hymne en Rose (melding Hymne à l'amour and La Vie en rose). The blending of accordion and trumpet was refreshing and delightful. The duo has played together for several years. Although I have no post to share from the concert, here is a recording of the duo performing *Tonight* which leaves the listener wanting to hear more from this gifted pair. https://

Félicien Brut's first US trip was in 2007 when he competed at Coupe Mondiale in Alexandria, VA. That year, France dominated the category for International Competition for Virtuoso Entertainment Music and Félicien placed in the top three. During the televised 2024 Olympics opening Brut was the winged accordionist perched on a bridge across the Seine River playing Piaf's La Foule right before the billowing plumes of red, white and blue smoke dramatically shot across the bridge. He now performs both as a soloist with major orchestras and as a central element of many chamber music ensembles.

Félicien Brut is among an elite cadre of world-class performing accordi-

onists. It was a thrill for SFAC member Ron Borelli (renowned San Francisco Bay Area professional accordionist and pianist) Félicien's concert and have a chance to meet him following his San Francisco concert at Herbst Hall.

A Musical Gem in the Sonoran Desert: Cactus meets Bellows

If you enjoy baseball, golf and fine dining, Old Town in Scottsdale, AZ is the place to be! Annually, March is high season for golf, resorts, and baseball's Cactus League, Spring Training for 15 teams in 10 stadiums. We recently visited friends and found a sold-out city, bustling with sports enthusiasts.

Scottsdale/Phoenix is also home to the historic Taliesin West (a studio and home developed by the American architect Frank Lloyd Wright) and another unique treasure: the world-class Musical Instrument Museum (MIM), (https://mim.org/), the largest institution of its type in the world, with a collection of over 15,000 instruments! Founded by the former Chairman/ CEO of Target Corporation, this huge collection is spread out in an ultramodern 200,000 square foot air-conditioned building. Its exhibits are organized by region (European, Asia, Africa, etc.) and by subcategory (strings, accordions, guitars, pianos, etc.).

The collection includes one VERY special instrument for the SFAC: an historic, vintage bandoneon, circa 1910, donated to our Club in late 2019 and subsequently donated by the Club to MIM for its permanent collection. This bandoneon was featured in our January, 2020 newsletter and is shown in this April newsletter for the 1st time in its museum display. Please note the donation plaque, acknowledging the San Francisco **Accordion Club!**

There are many accordions on display, only a few of which are shown here, both in a dedi-

cated accordion exhibit and elsewhere in the museum as an integral instrument to the music of many European cultures.

The museum is huge, so plan on spending several hours and/or multiple visits among the many galleries. Our visit was also enhanced by a special exhibit Stradivarius and the Golden Age of Violins and Guitars (https://mim.org/specialexhibitions/stradivarius-and-the-goldenage-of-violins-and-guitars/) which presented more than 70 of the most extraordinary and sought-after string instruments from iconic European makers of the 16th to the 19th century.

Our day at the Musical Instrument Museum was truly incredible, and aside from a long-overdue visit with friends, it was the highlight of our Scottsdale visit!

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
