The Steve Balich Sr. Polka Band

Steve is one of the originators of the festival who, along with **Clifton Buck-Kauffman** and **Jim Boggio**, pioneered this event in 1991.



The Steve Balich Sr. Polka Band has recorded three hit recordings of Italian music with no duplications. The Polka

Dance Party in the polka tent, where he fronts the **Steve Balich Sr. Polka Band**, remains one of the more popular attractions at the festival.

July 2014 Meeting Review by Deeana McLemore

July's program started with a wonderful warm up by the Jam Band - this month led by Kate Froeberg - and some announcements by Lynn Ewing. Next, Emcee Gus Greyhosky introduced a very special player, Stas Venglevski, who was in town as a featured artist at the ATG Festival. Gus had Stas demonstrate the wider range of the Bayan accordion. It has an octave higher and an octave lower than the piano accordion.



Stas opened the program with Asturias by Isaac Albeniz which required very precise fingering and had some amazing staccato suggesting both guitar sounds and the footwork of a flamenco

dancer. Next he played the March Finale from *Konzertstueck in F minor* by **Carl Maria von Weber**. This piece is from the Romantic School and was played with a great deal of feeling and drama. A very melodic *Jok de Nunte* arranged by one of Stas' favorite professors, **Vyatcheslay**

Gordzei, followed. It is a dance originating from Stas' home country, the Republic of Moldova.

Then Stas entertained with two Russian folk songs that mimicked winter storms in Russia. The first was *Tango Commander* by **Eugene Derbenko**, which included some foot clicking and stomping to accompany the accordion. The second was my personal favorite, a very melodic and uplifting piece by Derbenko. Stas then moved to his own original compositions. First he played *Anticipation*, a lovely piece he played earlier this year in a solo concert in Switzerland. His next composition was *Promised Tune* written in French style. He closed with a Brazilian Tango, *Odeon*, by **Ernesto Nazareth**. Playing this song required amazing speed with the four fingers of his right hand!

Jana Maas treated us to some excellent songs after Stas finished. She played *Star of the County Down*, an Irish Folk Song, followed by *White Ribbons* by Manos Hadjidakis who also wrote *Never on Sunday*. Jana said that 18 years ago she attended the Cotati Festival and decided to join SFAC which led to Galla-Rini camp where she made many friends. Through SFAC she has met many wonderful people including Stas. At Jana's

request, Stas joined her for a Tango that she wrote, Tango of the Evening, which featured great improvisations by both players. Then Jana played Moon River for Jim

Shoemaker and Black and White Rag by Scott
Joplin with great aplomb.
By the way, she led a workshop at ATG entitled



"All the Great Things I Learned at Camp."

Next was the break and time for raffles. Barbara Winter, from The Leavenworth International Accordion Celebration which was hosted by the Northwest Accordion Society, brought a special gift for the raffle. It turned out to be an attractive gingerbread accordion cookie with LIAC - 2014 written in the icing. (And it was delicious as I won it in the raffle!)

After the break, **Stas Venglevski** returned to play *Music* for a Found Harmonium by **Simon Jeffis** which included some unbelievable fingering. Next as requested by **Marian Kelly**, he played Summer Sunshine which Stas plays with **Joan Cochran Sommers** in their CD of the same name. It was dazzling. Then he played a tune for his Russian friend **Ozante Naigrishi** called *Playful Variations* by **Victor Gridin**.

Up next, SFAC President, **Lynn Ewing** joined Stas for some duets. The first was *Let's Play Together* which Stas wrote for two friends, and he and Lynn played it together in Las Vegas. Next they played a waltz, *Generation Relation*, that Stas wrote for their mutual friend **Joan Grauman**. It was exceptionally well done.

Some animal pieces followed: *Cats Ball* which Stas wrote and Lynn had played with **Sharon Greyhosky**. It was a grand duet with superb harmonizing between the accordions - and included some humor! Next was *Mice*

THE FLASHING ACCORDION By Donna Dee Ray

I have been asked by **Lynn Ewing** to share my special story. The San Francisco Accordion Club, and **Paul Cain** in particular, were "instrumental" in bringing a nearly five decade pursuit of mine to a beautiful conclusion.

I grew up in Kansas City, Missouri and studied accordion from **Joan Cochran Sommers** from age six through eighteen. During that time I was concert mistress for the UMKC Accordion Orchestra and won first place in the AAA Virtuoso division at age seventeen. My intent was to attend college at the University of Missouri at Kansas City Conservatory of Music concentrating in Accordion. Instead, upon high school graduation, I went on tour with **Fred Waring and the Pennsylvanians** playing Cordovox in the orchestra, and eventually married **Dennis Ray**, a singer with the group.

At age twelve my father bought me a special accordion from Cecil and Joan Cochran, the future Joan Sommers. I did not know that it was one of a kind but I loved it as did all of my friends. It was a Giulietti accordion with lights corresponding to notes being played. A year before my wedding, money was short and I sold that accordion to pay for my wedding dress. My immature thinking was that I would be playing Cordovox for the rest of my days and would not need this accordion.

For years I regretted letting that accordion go and searched decades for it. My husband heard about my "Light- Up Accordion" all those years but he had never seen it. I always wished that my children and grandchildren could have enjoyed seeing it played. My search for that accordion ended last year when I learned that it belonged to a collector of accordions. **Joan Sommers** sent me an email attachment of a San Francisco Accordion Club newsletter with a picture of **Paul Cain** holding that treasured accordion.

I contacted Paul by email once to let him know that I was the original owner. I simply said that if he ever decided to sell it to please let me know. I am a board member for the Accordionists and Teachers Guild and knew seeing the accordion at the 2014 ATG festival was going to be bittersweet. It had been 47 years since it was in my possession. Somehow over the years, it made its way to San Francisco and was in the estate of **John Molinari**, a prominent virtuoso accordionist, teacher, and a Giulietti-sponsored artist and dealer.

Two years ago, Paul Cain purchased a half-dozen accordions from the granddaughter of **John Molinari**. This unique light-up accordion was among the accordions that had been stored for years in a basement garage. The granddaughter did not know where it came from, but said that it had been in the family for years. Paul restored these accordions and added them to his large collection of sixty accordions. For this accordion, he converted the system from AC powered to a battery pack system and replaced incandescent flash light bulbs with LED lights.

I know that this prototype one-of-a-kind accordion must have been **Paul Cain**'s most prized accordion in his collection. During the week of the ATG festival, I again said a few times, "If you ever decide to sell it, please let me know." I did not really believe he would ever be interested in parting with it.

I had forgotten mentioning that I had a fabulous new acoustic/digital accordion that I was going to have to sell because it was too heavy for me to manage. I cautiously said, "Do you mean you would trade the lighted Giulietti?" I would have mortgaged my house to get this treasured accordion back in my possession. A trade was perfect! You cannot put a price on something that is priceless.

Paul is very happy and I am overjoyed! "I left my heart in San Francisco" when I brought my Light-Up Giulietti Accordion home after a 47-year absence.

In Memory of

WALTER MIGLIO TRAVERSO

July 28, 1923 - June 23, 2014

Walter Traverso, co-founder of the resurgent San Francisco Accordion Club, died on June 23, in Roseville, California, where he had retired to be closer to family members. He was a key player in organizing the picnic, newsletter, and contacting all the accordion players here in the Bay Area to restart SFAC around 1990. Along with his best friend, co-founder Rusty Bartoli, this resourceful and diligent duo started much of what the club is today!

I first met Walter when I was just 4-years old while getting my first haircut. Before picking up the accordion in his 50s, he owned the Amazon Barbershop. He eventually retired from his first profession and became one of the busiest accordion players around. I remember him always on the go playing his Midi box at so many venues, sometimes playing two jobs on the same day. And what he couldn't handle in bookings, he referred to other professional players, keeping them busy locally as well. After several years of playing solo, his wife, **Terri**, joined him in providing percussion, dance, and vocal accompaniment wherever they performed.

My memories of Walter will always be special -- to know him at a very early age when we didn't know we'd even be playing the instrument -- and having the wonderful privilege to work with him in the accordion world where I became one of his many friends.
