

Mike Zampiceni, SFAC Board Secretary, is our featured performer for this month.

Accordions were part of his family from day one, being the son of noted accordionist, teacher, composer, arranger and music publisher, Joseph Zampiceni. He began formal study of the accordion at age 8, and played his first paid engagements by age 11. At 14 he joined his father's orchestra, playing accordion and drums and by 17, he was in the musician's union, as leader of his own band. While in high school, Mike's choral teacher took note of his tenor voice and encouraged him to compete in vocal competitions and further his vocal studies.

Mike graduated from San Jose State University with a B.A. degree in Music, concentrating on voice, piano and organ. After a year's break, he returned to work on an M.A. degree, during which time he was chosen as the tenor soloist in a performance of a Bach cantata with the San Jose Symphony.

While presently engaged in a career in Information Technology, Mike has always been active in the music profession, continuing to play engagements and teach students. Groups he has played with include the San Jose Symphony and San Jose Civic Light Opera. His engagements range from strolling accordionist to church organist for weddings and memorial services. Mike's extensive repertoire includes American standards from the 30s to the 70s, commercial jazz and European music.

An Oakland native, Don Savant took accordion lessons for two years with a teacher from Menichetti Studio starting at age ten. As a junior in high school he was re-inspired by the younger John Molinari to again pick up the instrument, and purchased his white Giulietti from John Sr. It stayed in the closet most of the time he and his wife, Mary, were raising their four kids and he worked as an engineer in the electronics industry. Now in the 19th year of a second childhood, he "works" as a nature docent, hike leader, for Filoli and Henry Coe State Park, a conservation easement monitor for Peninsula Open Space Trust, and enjoys river kayaking, biking, swimming, hiking, rafting, and playing ukulele. In recent years he discovered the accordion community through a mutual acquaintance of Marian Kelly and now is thoroughly enjoying being tutored by Mike Zampiceni. He likes playing oldies from his parents era, and has played venues including the Filoli ballroom, and Red Wall Cavern at mile 33 of a fifteen-day raft trip through the Grand Canyon.



Big Lou, the Accordion Princess will be playing with Kit Robberson on viola da gamba for part of her program. Kit is part of Lou's French trio, studied music at the U of Texas and plays with several Renasisance groups. She studied with master musician Jordi Savall. Lou has played with such bay area notables as the Melotones, the Stir-Ups, Thee Hellhounds, and Polkacide. She founded Those Darn Accordions. Lou cut her musical teeth playing country-western piano in Austin, Texas. She loves most music, but has a soft spot for the ethnic variety, especially Eastern European polkas and French waltzes. A native of Hollywood, she also treasures movie music, and loves to play songs from the wide screen. Recently she had the totally unwarranted thrill of a lifetime playing in the tavern band in the Berkeley, Los Angeles, and New York productions of Wozzeck with the London Philharmonia.

January Meeting 2013

Sunday Jan. 20, 2013

The meeting opened with a few words of welcome from club President, Lynn Ewing, giving a nice introduction to Skyler Fell by recounting the many activities which she supports at her Accordion Apocalypse store. Skyler then demonstrated a brand-new Scandalli accordion (see page 4 photo). It was a beautiful instrument with a great sound. She played *Stolichnaya* (new words set to Kalinka). Every verse ended with the artist drowning their sorrows in vodka.

First to perform was **Big Lou**, **The Accordion Princess**, aka **Linda Seekins**. She performed two pieces that



were among her favorites, *Gay Ranchero*,

Mexican melody from many years ago, to which she sang along, and a haunting theme from the new musical

Madame X.

Next up was the group: Whiskey and Women, a trio of Renée de la Prade, Joan Wilson and Renée's sister Rosie. Renée explained how the group got its name. Cold and none too happy in the rain, in Edinburgh, Scotland, she and Joan decided that life might be warmer and better outside with a bottle of Jamieson's whiskey. They entertained the passersby for 90 minutes and collected enough money for a "wee dram" – Women and Whiskey was born. Renée plays accordion, Joan plays fiddle, and Rosie plays percussion, fiddle and accompaniment with tambourine and foot drum. The music was Cajun themed, footstomping and full of energy. The next thing you know, many people in the audience were on their feet dancing! The set began with a piece Renée said was a Cajun classic: Je t'ai au bas (I'm down in the dumps) that certainly got us interested. Then a song composed about an ex-boyfriend, simply called Girard. There was a Cajun waltz, and a song with lyrics about a chicken.





During the refreshments break, **Karla mi Lugo** (see photo on previos page) put on a wonderful short performance of playing her accordion while balancing her feet on a soccer ball and holding a large flower. Karla performs up and down the West Coast, mixing playing, singing, whistling and juggling.



Jet Black Pearl (aka Jetty Swart) took over the stage next. Many of Pearl's tunes and songs are original compositions: *Lips, Hot Boots, L'accordione and Rooster*. This last composition is a ballad about a rooster in a hen house.She also played a beautiful Bal Musette, first describing how we might hear it in the South of France on a warm evening with hundreds of people dancing, eating and having a good time.

Diana Strong described the genre of her musical selections (all self-composed) as Balkan. She began with Spiderweb waltz. This used every key as the basic theme, moving up and down in scales and octaves. *Sailor* is one of her newest pieces, with a melancholic mood.

She finished with two tunes in complicated time signatures 11/8 and 9/8, that are very typical of Balkan music. The last one was her composition called *Turkish Lullaby* – based on a traditional Turkish theme.

Both clad in kilts, Maggie Martin on accordion and her partner GDub on guitar began with the polka *Where is Diana?*, followed by *Luna* (about love

and Whiskey) and a French song about the sea, wind and where to find love. Their final tune was *Making Way* a new composition that starts slowly, gaining momentum and finally romping to a fine finish.

Our meeting was exciting, inspiring and very entertaining. It is great to hear younger musicians playing different styles of music. The accordion is enjoying a new rennaissance with musicians of all genres and ages.

President's Message

Our program last month got me thinking about what a wonderful and diverse instrument the accordion is. I remember Anthony Galla-Rini saying that the problem with the accordion was that it is too versatile! It can be used for jazz, classical, folk music, and just plain foot stomping fun. I think of other instruments which are used in as many settings, but seem to be taken more seriously—for example, the violin, enjoying a solid place in the symphony orchestra. Perhaps that is the reason it gets more respect. The accordion evokes strong emotions, and it's a bit of a mystery to me why this should be—but maybe that's why those of us who love it—love it so much!

When the accordion first evolved, with local musicians in the rural crevices of France, Italy or Germany playing for dances or singing around a campfire, they saw a fantastic, portable, instrument, which could be used to provide what everyone wanted and needed -music! In some ways, the young performers that we heard last month are bringing the accordion home to its roots—as a fabulous addition to creative expression and fun.When performers such as Guido Deiro and Anthony Galla-Rini took the accordion to incredible artistic heights, an attitude of envisioning the accordion to be a serious instrument created a chasm between serious accordionists and those who were using it mainly for entertainment and fun.

We are lucky in the San Francisco Bay area to have many musicians playing the accordion in different genres. In January, we had fresh, original music from young folks who have no preconceived idea of how the accordion *should* sound—they use it as an expressive creative musical choice. This month our featured artist is **Mike Zampiceni**, a skilled accordionist (see front page for his bio). In March, we will have **Iosiph Purit**, a young virtuoso bayan player from Russia, where the accordion (bayan) is not only an essential folk instrument, but is still taught routinely in conservatories. Bonnie Birch, coming in April, uses her accordion to provide musical entertainment in multiple venues, with a specialty in French music including vocal and guitar accompaniment. In May, Frank Petrilli, a protege of jazz legend Frank Marocco, will be performing with his own *latin* flavored jazz. In June, we will have Mike & Steve Trucco,

who play Italian music as a father son duet without the benefit of sheet music.

We continue our involvement with the Asian community through our work in the Accordions for Japan project, which I will talk about in more detail next month. Whether you are able to attend meetings or not, we urge you to support your club, which has one over-riding goal—to be a center for people who love the accordion in all its variety, and want to share it with the world. Whether you are a player or a listener, a button boxer, piano accordionist, bandoneon or concertina player, a jazz lover or a rocker, we want to be your place. Please renew your membership, come to our meetings, and bring your friends! There are manyaccordion lovers out there who don't even know about us. Let's celebrate our wonderful instrument!

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
SFAC Newsletter Ad Policy
