We are delighted to present two world class artists at our May musical meeting.



Stas Venglevski hardly needs any introduction. He and his compositions have graced our stage on many occasions in the past. Stas is a native of the Republic of Moldova and is an acclaimed virtuoso on the Russian Bayan. He graduated from the Russian Academy of Music in Moscow, studying with the famed Russian bayanist Friedrich Lips. In 1992, Stas immigrated to the United States.

Stas' repertoire includes original compositions and a broad range of music including classical, contemporary and ethnic. He also tours extensively throughout Europe and the United States. Stas has performed the world premiers of Galla-Rini's *Concerto #2* and *Bayan and Beyond* composed for him by Dan Lawitts. Also to his credit are several CD recordings and books of published original compositions. and nat Ios Ola She dea

Roza Borisova is the lovely wife of Stas

Venglevski and is a native of Ioshkar-Ola, Russia. She holds degrees from several respected institutions including a Doctor of

Musical Arts in String Quartet Performance from the Russian State Academy of Music. In 1989, Roza was selected to be the cellist of the Veronika String Quartet which led to many international engagements and awards. Amongst those awards was an invitation to the Veronika String Quartet to study with the Fine Arts Quartet at the University of Wisconsin, Milwaukee in 1993. They accepted the invitation and Roza relocated to the United States along with the Quartet.

Roza has served as Artist-in-Residence and a graduate teaching assistant at various institutions in Wisconsin, Ohio, Illinois, and Colorado, earning a Master of Music degree in Music Performance along the way. Currently, Roza performs with the Green Bay Symphony Orchestra and the Woodstock Mozart Festival Orchestra, Woodstock, Illinois. She also takes great pleasure in sharing her talent and love for the cello, teaching aspiring students, both privately and at the Lawrence Academy of Music in Appleton, Wisconsin, where she is currently on the faculty.

Vice-President's Message from Lynn Ewing

I am sure everyone who attended the San Francisco Accordion Club (SFAC) meeting on Sunday, April 20th, felt privileged to be there and to hear such fine artists. Mary Tokarski is a well known artist in the Eastern United States, but we rarely have an opportunity to hear her play out here in the West. Although I am lucky enough to work with Joe Smiell every week, it was my first time to hear his big band! Joe always arranges ensemble music with the idea of an orchestra in mind. He sets some parts as the brass, some as the woodwinds, and so on, so it was wonderful to hear "the real thing." Joe's band even played one piece that he wrote especially for SFAC president Frank Montoro - The Spanish March. It was so much fun to hear this piece originally composed for the Accordion Chamber Ensemble played by Joe's band!

As I listened to these wonderful musicians, I thought about the great gift that the San Francisco Accordion Club has been in my life. Through attending club meetings and various events that I found out about through the SFAC, I have been able to broaden my musical horizons immensely! Mary's remarks brought to mind how many great accordionists I would never have known of had it not been for attending various accordion events. This gives me an opportunity to encourage all of you to attend the upcoming Accordionists and Teachers Guild (ATG) Accordion Convention, being held in Santa Clara this July, that will feature both well-known artists from our own area, and national and international artists that we rarely have a chance to experience!

Mary Tokarski spoke of Maddalena Belfiore as she played Maddalena's composition, *Scherzo in Bb minor*. Many of you may not know who Maddalena was - I myself heard of this amazing woman for the first time at the Coupe Mondiale in 2007. She was instrumental in bringing the 2007 Coupe to the US held in Alexandria, Virginia in August 2007, in celebration of the CIA's 60th anniversary (the "other" CIA - Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes). The Maddalena Belfiore Entertainment Competition for Female Accordionists was held at this Coupe, and was open to female accordionists of all ages. I was fortunate enough to have been present at this contest, won by Betty Jo Simon, and hear many famous and up-and-coming women accordionists perform. It was a truly memorable and inspirational experience. Some of these fabulous accordionists will be playing at the upcoming ATG convention, and **you** can hear them too!

There is a wonderful memorial article about Maddalena Belfiore-Greco written by Faithe Deffner that can be viewed online, which I highly recommend. (<u>http://</u><u>www.accordions.com/memorials/mem/belfiore-</u><u>greco_maddalena/index.shtml</u>) Briefly - she was a powerhouse in the Accordion World. She was elected to the American Accordionists Association (AAA) Board of Governors in 1955 and to the office of secretary a decade later. In 1971, she became the organization's first female president, breaking through the glass ceiling, which dictated that top posts were reserved for men. She served as President of the AAA three separate times, and made countless contributions to the accordion world. Sadly, Maddalena passed away just before the Coupe, in May of 2007.

Mary also played a piece by Charles Magnante, and that brought to mind fond thoughts of Tom Bruno, who passed away so tragically in December 2008. We were lucky to have Tom's father, Anthony, at this meeting. Tom was a wonderful accordionist, and he had a particular specialty in playing Charles Magnante's music. He did a wonderful workshop on Charles Magnante at Galla-Rini camp several years ago. Tom compiled many of Charles Magnante's performances in a CD set, and also has a CD in which he plays both well- and lesser-known Magnante pieces. I bought two CD's of Magnante's music at the Las Vegas convention, and you can find them by emailing Joe Cairo at <u>icairo3@peoplepc.com</u>.

Finally, Mary played a piece by Eugene Ettore, who is another accordion legend that had somehow missed my radar. Eugene was one of Maddalena's teachers, also a

past president of the AAA, and a prolific composer. Rita Davidson was also a student and protégé of Eugene Ettore, and she played an unforgettable concert of his music at the Marocco Event in 2010. Rita's website <u>www.accordionusa.com</u> is a must visit for all accordionists.

April Musical Meeting — 20 Years and . .

We had the great pleasure of a visit from **Dr**. **Anthony Bruno**, who flew out from Pennsylvania to meet the

people who knew his late son **Tom Bruno**, extraordinary accordion technician and player. Val read a very moving paragraph that Dr. Bruno had hoped to deliver himself but felt he couldn't, thanking club members for the floral tribute sent by the club when Tom passed away over a year ago, and expressing appreciation to all Tom's friends. Anthony has told me many times that he intends to remain a member of the

SFAC for the rest of his life as it gives him a special rapport with Tom's Bay Area friends. We thank you so much, Anthony.

President **Frank Montoro** pointed out that this is the 20th anniversary of our club in its present incarnation,

and three of the five founders were at today's meeting.

The MC for today's program was **Skyler Fell**. She reminded everyone that the Accordion Teachers Guild (ATG) Convention is coming up July 21-25 in San Jose.

ATG President **Dee Langley** and also our performing artist **Mary Tokarski** are out here in the Bay Area working on the organization of the ATG Convention. Dee

addressed the crowd about the ATG convention.

Mary Tokarski from Connecticut was our individual performing artist of the day, and did she perform! Anne and Bernard Métais very kindly produced a printed program for today's musical presentation. With credit and thanks to Anne and Bernard, I quote or paraphrase from that program. Mary won 185 trophies and awards, including two U.S. Championship titles, and third place in the 1973 Confédératon Internationale des Accordéon-

istes' (CIA) Coupe Mondiale, and second place in that year's Coupe Mondiale Pops category.

Mary worked for many years as a music teacher in the North Haven, Connecticut Dept. of Education Early Childhood Development Program at Green Acres Elementary School, and teaches special

-needs children at a local elementary school. In 1983 she founded the Tokarski Music Center, where she taught piano and accordion, conducted choral and ensemble programs, and served as Director of Music Education. Mary's credentials go on and on--she performs and teaches all over the country and the world, and is on the governing board of the American Accordionists Association (AAA) and the ATG. She performed as a duo with her sister Julie and with both Julie and brother Walt as the wellknown "K Trio."

Oh yes, Mary is the narrator and accordionist of the successful (and adorable) children's book and CD titled An Accordion! What Is That?, copies of which were for sale at the meeting.

On to Mary's outstanding performance today: How does one describe true excellence in accordion performance? You can't. You have to hear it.

Mary wowed everyone with Dance of the Demon by Eduard von Holst; Spanish Holiday by Eugene Ettore; Ritual Fire Dance from "Love the Magician," a 20-minute opera by Manuel de Falla; Mary's own arrangement of Gounod's Ave Maria which Gounod adapted from J.S. Bach; Remembering a Legend: Charles Magnante, com-

posed by Dr. William Schimmel after Magnante died; Scherzo in B Flat Minor which the late Maddalena Belfiore wrote many years ago for her father. Mary was friends with Maddalena, and she edited the piece at the request of Maddalena's family. Next was The Flying Butterfly, by John Pezzolo; an arrangement Mary did years ago of Moon River by Henry Mancini. Mary concluded with The Fox and the Hound by Frank Mucedola, which has become her signature piece.

The audience was spellbound. It just doesn't seem possible that one can play a piano accordion with such technical excellence. Thank you so much, Mary. I wish we could hear you more often.

After the break with our 20th anniversary cake, Tuti's excellent food, and the drawings (our own young Lorenzo Lucchesi won the cash drawing!), we were

treated to still another amazing and memorable performance: by **Joe Smiell's Big Band** of 18 players.

We all know that Joe has several bands, mostly in the 3-to-5-instrument range. Today we heard his BIG band, with trumpets and the works, and we were blown right out of our seats!

They started off with the famous Bavarian *Ein Prosit der Gemütlichkeit*,

which right away got many people singing the well-known Oktoberfest tune. Then they played a polka (Joe is known

for rendering the polka as a true art form); a Bavarian Ländler dedicated to Joe's friend Barney Berlenbach (who once helped get Joe started by giving him a job); the French march *Le Régiment de Sambre et Meuse*, with our surprise conductor, **Bernard Métais**! Then a Polish number with lots of old Polish folk melodies; then a Swiss Ländler, faster than most other

Ländlers; and an Austrian "Boarischer." (Joe explained that the Gavotte, the Schottische, the Rheinländer and

the Boarischer all have a similar sound and speed). As an aside, Joe noted that every village in Austria has a town band (I have experienced that myself and it's wonderful).

Then they played a sort of Call to Arms number with trumpets in all corners of the room, bringing out goose bumps bigtime; then a polka from the Frankfurt area. Joe introduced Dale Heinmiller who has been with Joe's band for 50 years, and also Dick Bronstein of Bronstein's Music in South San Francisco (everyone should know this place-it's terrific). Then the band played Bavarian "Schunkel" music--where everyone locks arms and sways from side to side to the music, getting everyone in a party mood. They played another polka (no name--just "P-13"), a trombone special, Leroy Anderson's *Trumpeters' Holiday*, a Spanish march (the same one we in the ACE Ensemble have played many times--it was fun to hear it played by many different instruments), and ended with a lively Bavarian beer hall medley.

Joe writes all his music by hand--no computer-including all the parts and the score, and it was utterly amazing to learn that this band was sight-reading all this music for the first time! That shows what first-class musicians these people are, and how each of them has a special rapport with Joe and his musical style.

This was without a doubt one of our *best ever* programs, one that we shall never forget.

Julie Alvarado-"Accordion" artist

A couple of months ago, I was introduced to **Julie Alvarado** via my accordion teacher, Lou Jacklich. Julie is a local artist and I attended an art exhibit of hers, entitled: *Accordion Dreams*. Mr. Jacklich provided lovely accordion music as a backdrop to Julie's works of art, which featured *accordions*!



I was so impressed by the beauty and cleverness of her oils, that I felt it very necessary to share her art with my fellow accordionists. All of you who discover her art, as I did, will be amazed!

Julie is an accomplished artist who paints with oils. She is classically trained and has a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Cal State University - Fullerton and a Master of Fine Arts (with High Distinction) from the California College of the Arts in Oakland.

Julie is an artist, but also an accordionist, taught by maestro, Lou Jacklich. She was so inspired by this wonderful instrument that it is featured in many of the oils that she displays in local art galleries. In Julie's own words: "I began wanting to learn to play the accordion because of an enchanted evening and a bumper sticker. Learning to play the accordion has proved to be a transformative, humorous and spiritual experience that has infiltrated and, for a time, taken over my paintings. The accordion has been an intimate companion and has connected me to a worldwide community. I can also now say with pride that I play the accordion and I vote."

Julie also is a teacher. The best job that she ever had, she recounts, is teaching art to adults with disabilities. Over the last ten years, she has been an Art Specialist for the City of Walnut Creek and also worked at the Creative Growth Art Center in Oakland as a teacher.




