**Cory Pesaturo** (aka **C Pez**) is a World Digital Accordion (Coupe Mondiale) and World Acoustic Accordion (Primus Ikaalinen) Champion!





Cory graduated from the prestigious New England Conservatory of Music where he was the first musician ever to major and graduate in the accordion. Additionally, Cory is the only person to ever win World Championships on Acoustic, Digital, and Jazz Accordion.

Pesaturo's extensive resumé includes appearances at the White House on 4 different occasions, starting when he was only 12 years old. Cory has performed in 5 different continents, in countries such as Italy, Canada, New Zealand, Japan and Tunisia.

Cory is known as both a visionary and a rebel within the main United States accordion world, but his main contribution is his forward thinking on how the accordion should be used, played, and presented in the modern music world.

# A Very Special Musical Afternoon with Bobby Dietsch

Our April meeting was emceed by **Scott Anderson**, and as usual started with our venerable jam band, this month led by **Don Savant**. Thank you, Scott and Don!

Our featured special guests were **Bobby Dietsch** and family. To be with us, and solely for this occasion, they traveled to Millbrae all the way from Crestline, a resort mountain town in the San Bernardino Mountains. Bobby is classically trained, having taken up the accordion at age 7. He performed professionally for many years with the **Union Ensemble** and **Alpine Quartet** in Southern California, Las Vegas, and elsewhere, starting at age 15, no less! He's devoted the last 10 years to other passions (he's a pastor and leads an **Assemblies of God Church** in his area), so at the urging of our

Club and his family, Bobby emerged from professional musical retirement to perform for the 1<sup>st</sup> time in a decade, just for us.

And what an afternoon it was, Bobby was sensational! He played an array of tunes, many familiar, others not so much; but all with a particularly smooth style that is so easygoing and enjoyable to hear. And, to boot, he's an excellent technician and singer. Bobby's technique and passion were abundantly evident, with great flare and bass solos. He was here to have fun with us! Putting it all together, we had a wonderful time!

Bobby opened on his Scandalli Super VI model N. Of the five that that are known to still exist, his is considered the best. He purchased it way back in the 1960s as a 15 year old teenager. It was the 1<sup>st</sup> accordion in the world to have 6 switches on the bass. His instrument features 11 switches on the left along with an octave coupler which "kills the piccolo", so it has a range of 4 octaves without the free bass, or 22 combinations.

<u>American songs</u>: Bobby opened with two songs made famous by **Herb Alpert and the** 

**Tijuana Brass**, *Spanish Flea* and *Tijuana Taxi*, followed by a great *Bye Bye Blackbird* and *Ain't She Sweet*, both with vocal accompaniment, no less! Bobby's unique arrangements, jazzy syncopation, and vocals provided both contemporary spin and were great fun!

<u>Italian songs</u>: Bobby is half Italian (Mom) and half German (Dad). So, in honor of his heritage, he next transitioned to Italian songs, including a beautiful, complex *Tarantella*, followed by *Funiculi*, *Funicula* and a 3<sup>rd</sup> Italian song. Next, was his own interpretation of *Come Back to Sorrento*, in honor of his 91-year-old Mom and her Italian heritage. It was touching and beautifully performed with the rich, deep tones/chords of the Scandalli. As Bobby's daughter Genesis noted in the chat window: "Thank you all for having Dad play, it was a pleasure to watch with Grandma! She laughed, cried and loved every minute." That's what it's all about, everyone!



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
<u>Irish songs</u>: Next was *Danny Boy*, in honor of his late father, who passed away this January at age 97. Bobby's parents were married 73 years! Next was the famous *Irish Jig* with lots of great bass work. One could hear and visualize bagpipes, not surprising given that both the accordion and bagpipes are wind instruments.

At this point in his program Bobby switched to his Zupan accordion to play German, Swiss and other genres. His Zupan is a unique instrument, one of only three made by Valentin Zupan in his garage before he went to Italy. It was hand built for the number one accordionist in British Columbia. The black keys don't go under the grill; the switches are embedded in the keyboard, rather than the grill. It has extra keys in the bass. It weighs in at 26 lbs; by comparison the Scandalli weighs 30 lbs. There are only 3 similar Zupans: one in Texas, one at Epcot Center, FL, and Bobby's accordion.

Bobby played a terrific, bouncy German tune, *In den Bergen* (*In the Mountains*). It was a polka, beautifully performed, and the Zupan gave it a Slovenian/alpine sound. This was one of my favorite songs of the day! Next was a beautiful waltz, *Tulips from Amsterdam* followed by a boarischer, a traditional folk dance, usually played on a button box accordion. Bobby played *Stillupa Simal Boarischer*, a terrific dance number! Bobby swayed from side-to-side, exaggerating the tempo and dance nature of this wonderful song. Next was another German waltz, *Das Kufsteiner Lied*; followed by a

mazurka, a Polish folk dance in 6/8 time. Unlike a waltz in ¾ time where each ¼ note gets one count, a mazurka is faster, as each 8<sup>th</sup> note gets one count. This particular song, written by John Pezzolo, is titled *The Beautiful Butterfly* - so expertly performed! He closes his eyes; he's reading the music on his eyelids. This was a lovely, crisp, technically difficult waltz with a lovely bass line. Next was Bobby's arrangement of *Schnee Walzer* (*Snow Waltz*) followed by a polka called *When the Salmon Start to Run*.

<u>Finale</u>: Bobby's daughter Christine joined him with a stunning vocal performance! He's a pastor and has been an ordained minister of the **Assemblies of God** for more than 30 years. Some psalms sound like polkas, including the next song he played, *I am on My* 



Finally, thanks to those who made today's program possible. Both the Coopersteins, who heard Bobby play at a meeting of the former Los Angeles **Accordionaires Accordion Club** several years ago, and Rosemary Busher, who spent time with and heard him play at the **Cotati Accordion Festival** last year, brought Bobby to our attention. They loved his playing,



and he told them he was willing to come to the Bay Area.
Also thanks to Randy Hicks for manning the door; Don Savant for leading the jam; Scott
Anderson for serving as emcee; and Curtis Hollenbeck and Rosemary Busher, for providing additional light snacks.



# Remembering Lou Jacklich 1928-2024

Wishing Lou Jacklich a happy heavenly birthday on the anniversary of his passing, May 6, 2024, World Accordion Day. He was 95 and played the accordion for over 85 years. He was an active volunteer, performer, donor and distinguished life-member with the SFAC. A few students, and SFAC members share their memories below.

"Mr. Jacklich's generous bequest to the club enables us to feature performers, such as Cory and Bobby Dietsch!" Ken Schwartz, SFAC President

"Lou Jacklich was a bright point in my week when going to him for lessons. I will remember everything he taught me." David Kautz

"I'm most thankful that, despite his long history of teaching, he was not committed to any one method or

series of books and was able to tailor the lesson experience according to the student's goals and needs. It was interesting that most of his students were adults in their 50's-70's, whereas back in the heyday of his music school, all of his students were school age. Maybe that's not so unusual for the accordion these days.

My favorite thing about Lou as a teacher is that he picked up his own accordion during my lesson and sometimes played almost as much as I did (!)...either to demonstrate the part I was trying to play, accompany me, or demonstrate embellishments for me to strive for after mastering the piece as written. After so many years of playing and teaching, he was still interested in every student's progress as well as their particular areas of musical and performing interest." Elaine Cooperstein

"One of my best memories of Mr. J is how he opened his home to have celebrations with us. He truly had fun and so did we. All were welcome, even my mom and brother who weren't his students, were welcome to play music together, eat and drink. I miss these gatherings. We'd all await the moments when he'd play for us. He was truly generous with his gift of music." *Pamela Lister* 

"During his lessons, Mr. Jacklich shared his knowledge of music and experiences as a professional accordionist and teacher. His students received insight into the joys and challenges of being a professional musician and instructor. Mr. Jacklich had a great sense of humor and enjoyed sharing stories about his successes and mistakes which we could learn from. At his first public performance (12 years old), he enjoyed fried chicken but the results were slippery fingers on the keyboard which he struggled but managed to play! The lesson was... wait until after performing before eating.

Mr. Jacklich was humble about his career as an early pioneer of the electronic accordion using the Lovell Organ Unit (Ken Lovell, inventor, Southern California). As an entertainer and entrepreneur, in the early 60s he produced an LP record album, Lou Jacklich Plays which was available at his venues. In reference to a performance, The California Lumber Merchant (May 1963) published this laudatory statement: 'Lou Jacklich, one of the really great musical acts in show biz today. Uses an electronically amplified accordion with stereo speaker - now on a Columbia long play album.' "Pamela Tom

Robert and Elaine recently made the acquaintance of a talented musician - who happens to be a retired middle-school music teacher - at our Wednesday morning music circle in Englewood, Florida. Jacky mentioned that she too owns an accordion because she used to play along with one of her students, who later became a very famous jazz accordionist!

Now who might that have been?
